What is Vocational Rehabilitation?

As your child progresses through adolescence, it's important to think about what comes after high school. Some young adults will continue their education with help from state and local programs, while others may want to enter the work force. Vocational rehabilitation (often called Voc Rehab) is a program that helps people with disabilities get and keep jobs.

The federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 authorized grants for state-run vocational rehabilitation services for people with disabilities. If someone already receives disability benefits from the government, they may automatically qualify for vocational rehabilitation services. These services help individuals enter or return to the workforce. The support offered by vocational rehabilitation may include:

A personal assessment of their disabilities

Job counseling and guidance

On-the-job training

Transportation while receiving services

Personal assistance and job coaching

Help finding a job

Financial assistance, if needed
